MAYORAL PROCLAMATION

"April is Parkinson's Disease Awareness Month"

WHEREAS: Parkinson Society Canada is celebrating 40 years as the

national organization that helps to ease the burden and find a cure through research, education, advocacy and support services to improve the quality of life for those affected by

Parkinson's disease.

WHEREAS: Nearly 100,000 Canadians, and 6.3 million people world-

wide, have Parkinson's disease today.

WHEREAS: There is no way to predict or prevent Parkinson's disease.

It strikes randomly – affecting all genders, races, socioeconomic groups and lifestyles. Parkinson's disease is a chronic and progressive neurodegenerative illness that slowly but dramatically robs people of their independence over time. For most affected, their minds remain sharp while they endure an ever-changing combination of tremors, slowness, stiffness, balance problems, speech problems, rigid muscles, and pain. Many have difficulty

walking, talking, and/or swallowing.

WHEREAS: Canadians with Parkinson's disease and their caregivers

rely on Parkinson Society Canada to provide them with information, resources and support groups to help better manage the physical and psychological effects of this

debilitating disease.

WHEREAS: Through our partnerships with our twelve regional partners,

health care professionals, research associations, and volunteers, Parkinson Society Canada touches every

community across the country.

WHEREAS: Parkinson Society Canada has funded almost \$11 million

dollars in research grants in its quest to find better treatment, and ultimately a cure for Parkinson's disease.

NOW THEREFORE: I, Frank Scarpitti, Mayor of the Town of Markham, do

hereby proclaim **April 2008** as "**Parkinson's Disease Awareness Month**" and encourage everyone to support Parkinson Society Canada during its Spring Campaign.

FACT SHEET

About Parkinson's disease

- Described by Dr. James Parkinson in 1817 (British doctor)¹
- Parkinson's is a progressive neurological disease⁶
- When cells in the brain that normally produce a chemical called "dopamine" die, symptoms of Parkinson's appear²
- Most common symptoms are: tremor (shaking); slowness in movements, muscle stiffness and problems with balance³
- Other symptoms may also occur for some people, such as fatigue, difficulties with speech and writing, sleep disorders, depression and cognitive changes^{3, 4}
- Currently there is no cure for Parkinson's disease³
- Most people manage their symptoms through medication³
- A small percentage of people with Parkinson's may benefit from surgery³
- Other interventions such as exercise programs and speech therapy can also help³
- Parkinson's progresses over time at different rates for each person³
- Finding the right treatment as symptoms change over time is important and requires the expertise of specialized health-care professionals
- A single cause for PD has not been identified. Researchers are studying many theories such as the role of genetics and environmental exposure⁴

About Parkinson's disease in Canada

- It is estimated that more than 100,000 Canadians have Parkinson's disease^{2,3,4,5}
- This number is underestimated as there is no national population-based study on PD
- The majority of those diagnosed are over the age of 65²
- The average age of diagnosis is 60 years³
- Parkinson's disease is not a normal part of aging³; but the incidence increases with age²
- Due to the increase of baby boomers, this number is expected to rise dramatically The population aged 65 and over is predicted to rise over 30 years from 11.6% to $23.6\%^2$
- 20% under the age of 40⁴ commonly known as "Young Onset"
- Direct costs for Parkinson's disease (hospital and physician care and drugs) total \$86.8 million²

Parkinson Society Canada

- PSC was founded in 1965 to enhance the lives of Canadians living with PD⁵
- PSC is a national, not-for-profit, volunteer-based organization with 12 regional partners and over 200 chapters and support groups across Canada⁵
- Its mission is to: Ease the burden; find a cure . . .through research, education, support and advocacy
- Since 1981 PSC has funded over \$13 million in Research Grants (fund approximately \$1M per year for scientific research)

- In the Fall 2006, PSC will fund a pilot project as part of the newly launched psychosocial research program
- Since 1981, the National Clinical Program has awarded over \$3 M to clinics and community organizations that provide programs and services for people living with Parkinson's disease
- Information and support for people living with PD, their families and health-care professionals are available from PSC and its regional partners.

- April is Parkinson's disease awareness month; PSC seeks to raise the awareness and understanding of Parkinson's disease
- PSC has adopted WHO's World Charter on Parkinson's disease⁶ that people with the disease have the right to:
 - o Be referred to a doctor with a special interest in PD
 - Receive an accurate diagnosis
 - Access to support services
 - o Receive continuous care, and
 - o Take part in managing the illness
- National Advocacy efforts have identified two major issues⁶
 - Sustained research funding
 - o Universal access to home care services and supports

About SuperWalk

- SuperWalk for Parkinson's: takes place every September in over 80 communities across Canada
- 12,000 participants are expected to walk in 2007
- The first walk took place in 1990 with seven walkers in Ontario
- Since 2000 SuperWalk has raised \$9.8 million
- Funds raised from SuperWalk go to research and support services
- This year's goal is \$2.1 million
